

Brief Embassy Report on Bilateral Relations – ITJ Division, DGCI&S, Kolkata.

India – Mozambique Bilateral Relations

A. Introduction

1. Indian Trade Journal (ITJ) division of the Directorate General of Commercial Intelligence and Statistics (DGCIS) brings out weekly publication on Embassy Profile Report providing information on recent policy changes and happenings in other countries that may be of interest to the Indian trading community. This is the Embassy Profile Report for 11.02.2026 depicting the Embassy of Mozambique.

2. India enjoys warm, friendly and substantive ties with Mozambique. After 1947, independent India's support for the Mozambican freedom struggle established the basis for warm political ties between the leaderships of both countries. Diplomatic relations between India and Mozambique were established as soon as Mozambique became independent in 1975, and India was among the first countries to set up a diplomatic mission in Mozambique. In fact, the Indian Ambassador had attended the first flag hoisting ceremony of independent Mozambique on 25 June 1975. Mozambique opened its Mission in New Delhi in 2001. Trade links between Mozambique and the western states of India go back to several centuries and pre-date the colonial era. These ancient people-to-people links have been built upon in modern times to forge a strong bilateral relationship based on regular political contacts, ever-deepening economic engagement and a well-integrated Indian community in Mozambique.

B. Political Relations

Visit of Mozambique's President (9-11 Jan 2024)

3. Former President Filipe Nyusi visited India for the Vibrant Gujarat Summit and met PM Narendra Modi. They discussed bilateral relations as also cooperation in multilateral fora, including the UN. Both leaders agreed to remain in touch and maintain the pace of high-level political contacts between the two countries. President Nyusi also addressed Mozambique India Business Forum and invited Indian investors to invest in Mozambique.

4. President Nyusi had paid State Visit to India (4-8 Aug 2015). He also met PM Narendra Modi on the sidelines of the BRICS Summit in Johannesburg (24 Aug 2023). PM Modi and President Nyusi participated in the High-level Event on Green Credits Programme at COP28 Summit in Dubai (1 Dec 2023). President Nyusi and PM Modi had telephonic conversation where they discussed about the Covid pandemic and its impact on global economies (3 June 2020).

Recent Visits From India

5. External Affairs Minister Dr. S. Jaishankar visited Mozambique (13-15 April 2023). He called on the President of Mozambique and the President of the National Assembly. EAM held talks with Foreign Minister (6th Joint Commission meeting) and met Minister of Health and Transport Minister. During the visit, EAM took a short ride on Made in India train from Maputo to Machava along with the Mozambican

Transport Minister. Then, EAM virtually inaugurated the Buzi bridge constructed under concessional line of credit .EAM also addressed the Indian community in Maputo.

6. Minister for Petroleum and Natural Gas; Housing and Urban Affairs Shri Hardeep S. Puri visited Mozambique (28-31 Oct 2023). He called on President of Mozambique; held talks with Minister for Mineral Resources & Energy and Minister of Economy & Finance.

7. Shri Dammu Ravi, Secretary (Economic Relations) attended the inauguration of H.E. Mr. Daniel Francisco Chapo as President of Mozambique (15 Jan 2025). During the visit, Secy (ER) addressed the Indian community in Maputo. He also visited the Fast Interceptor Boat Umbelozi gifted by GoI to Mozambique Navy and met Chairman of Board of Directors of Mozambican Railways and Ports.

C. Economic & Commercial Relations

8. Bilateral commercial relations between India and Mozambique have steadily enhanced in recent years. The presence of Indian companies in Mozambique has now increased to over 100. Indian investments in Mozambique are valued approximately at USD 10 billion. Economic relations have steadily deepened and expanded mainly through greater involvement of Indian companies that have invested heavily in the natural gas and coal sectors. Bilateral trade has also been rapidly growing in recent years. The most important exports from India are refined petroleum products, pharmaceuticals, machinery etc., whereas coking coal, cashew and raw agri products are the leading Mozambican exports to India.

D. Institutional Mechanisms

- The fifth session of Joint Commission on Economic, Cultural, Scientific and Technical Cooperation was held in Maputo (14 April 2023). EAM Dr. S. Jaishankar and FM Veronica Macamo Dlhovo chaired the meeting.
- The 4th meeting of Joint Defence Working Group was held in New Delhi (25 April 2023). Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of National Defence of Mozambique led the delegation.
- The 4th meeting of JWG on Mines and Mineral Resources was held in New Delhi (6 June 2023).
- The second meeting of Foreign Office Consultations at the level of Joint Secretary was held in New Delhi (4 July 2022).
- The second meeting of JWG on MSMEs was held in New Delhi (8 July 2019).

Development Partnership

- In recent years, India's support for Mozambique's development agenda has become an important priority under a vibrant, robust and versatile bilateral relationship between both countries. Most of this assistance has been provided through concessional Lines of Credit (LOC) implemented through EXIM Bank of India.
- By implementing projects under its concessional LoCs, India has extended support to Mozambique in diverse areas - provision of drinking water, improving power generation and distribution, improving agricultural productivity, rehabilitation of irrigation infrastructure, creation of an Information Technology Park, construction of an assembly plant for solar cells, rehabilitation of road networks, construction of housing units, railway equipment etc.
- Under LOC of USD 149.72 million, Afcons is undertaking the construction of Tica-Buzi and Nova- Sofala roads in central Mozambique.
- Under LOC of USD 95 million, RITES has supplied Made in India railway rolling stock including locomotives, wagons and coaches.
- In the aftermath of Cyclone IDAI in March 2019, Government of India had deployed three Indian Naval Ships to provide Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Relief (HADR) to the affected people in the Beira province of Mozambique. In December 2021, INS Kesari delivered consignment of 500 MT of rice.
- In February 2022, India and Mozambique signed a MoU for implementation of a Drinking Water Project at the Mueda District under Government of India's grant assistance of USD 10 million.
- Macomia Health Centre in northern Mozambique is being rehabilitated by India and UNDP.

Capacity Building

- The most visible and appreciated form of development partnership extended by India to Mozambique is in the form of scholarships and training opportunities in India. There are 55 Indian scholarships available for Mozambican students to pursue Undergraduate and Postgraduate studies in India.
- Government of India sponsors about 100 short-term training courses every year to Mozambican nationals. These courses are fully funded by India and have helped improve human resources in Mozambique.

Community and Cultural Relations

- Around 20,000 Mozambican nationals trace their ancestry to India. Most of them are from Gujarat, Goa, Daman & Diu. The Indian diaspora is mostly engaged in wholesale and retail trade in Mozambique, where it has made a strong and dominant mark. The Indian community of Mozambique is well integrated into the local economy and society and is contributing to the creation of wealth and employment in Mozambique. It has also preserved its cultural roots from India.
- In addition, there are around 3000 Indian nationals in the country engaged in various Indian companies or working as professionals in Mozambican companies. There are several community associations of the Indian community, which regularly organize charitable and cultural events.
